Dr. Giordano specializes in addictions counseling with clinical, instructional, and scholarly experience related to both chemical and behavioral addictions. She is the sole author of a clinical reference book titled, A Clinical Guide to Treating Behavioral Addictions and co-author of a textbook titled, Addiction Counseling: A Practical Approach. Dr. Giordano works to advance the counseling field with rigorous research and has published over 60 peer-reviewed articles and book chapters. She regularly teaches addictions counseling courses at the undergraduate and graduate level. Dr. Giordano works to raise public awareness about behavioral addictions by regularly offering community trainings and workshops (both domestically and internationally), being a guest on podcasts, and contributing to news media stories on the topic of addiction. She also writes a blog for Psychology Today called, "Understanding Addiction."

Aileen graduated from the Rochester Institute of Technology, having earned both a bachelor's and master's degree while enrolled there.

Aileen serves as the Regional Rehabilitation Counselor for the Deaf at the South Carolina Vocational Rehabilitation Department and works with Deaf adults and Deaf transition students in the Midlands area of SC. She provides rehabilitation counseling services, assists with obtaining and maintaining employment, provides access to training and evaluation, provides services such as ASL interpreters for classes or job interviews, counsels about post-secondary education options, teaches self-advocacy skills and much, much more.

Mr. Wilson is also available for 1:1 consultation as described in his "Meet your Librarian" introduction video here.



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
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#### **Wellness Corner**

## **APA Writing Tips**

#### **Title Page Setup**

The title page is the first thing a person sees when reading your paper, so is important to make a good first impression! Students should usually use the student title page format and include the following elements, in the order listed:

- Paper title
- Name of each author
- Affiliation for each author
- Course number and name
- Instructor name
- Assignment due date

\*Do not forget page number 1 in the top right corner of the page header!
